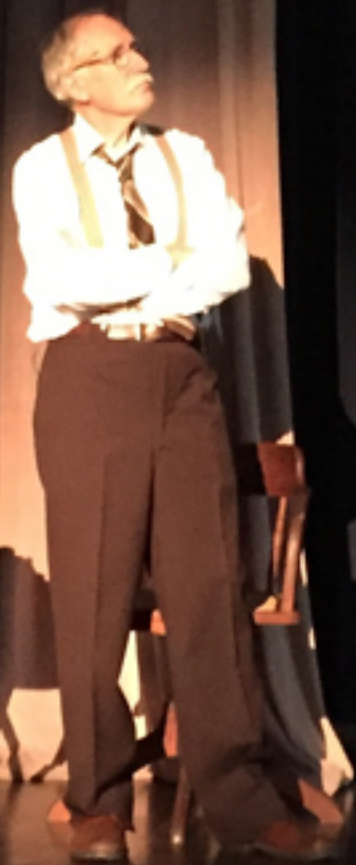

the case, considered the dangerous  
knowledge Dr. Dean is alleged to have  
given to a jury witness whom he is  
said to have dispatched for secret ser-  
vice agents the day before his death;  
heard the government detectives'  
stories and the townspeople's stories  
but still failed to find anyone whom  
they could indict for the crime. If  
it was a "gang murder" as alleged, the  
jury probably knew this as well as  
any one does now, but still could not  
identify the "gang" or any of them.

one in Jaffrey or Peterboro tempo-  
rarily or permanently, whom they  
could apprehend as German agents.  
International features of the case are  
hinted at and are to be disclosed. It is
