ARCHIE COLL, A JAFFREY NATIVE



Born August 7, 1911 in the former Ensign Wilder house in "Ballou City" which his father, Zoel Coll, bought in 1905.

5th of 10 children born to Zoel and Fedora Coll who emigrated here from Canada.



ATTENDED LOCAL SCHOOLS

Graduated from Jaffrey Junior High School in 1926. Always a worker! Worked at the Mower Farm summers raising and selling eggs, vegetables and milk.





Played baseball and basketball in high school. Graduated from Conant in 1930 with a diploma <u>and</u> two certificates in poultry raising he earned from correspondence courses

"THE FARM"

Nathan Cutter; married Polly Pope , daughter of Capt. William Pope, who owned the neighboring dairy farm. Jonas Pierce, Addison Pierce, Clark Myron Pierce. All were successful dairymen and farmers.

Zoel and Archie Coll – Bought the Clark M. Pierce farm together in September of 1930, just 3 months after Archie's high school graduation and one year after the start of the great depression.

Began operating as both a dairy and chicken farm.

On December 9, 1943, the home of Archie Coll at Pierces Crossing was destroyed by a fire. The original house attached to it was saved.























JAFFREY BRIEFS

ARCHIE COLL recently retired after being <u>director of</u> <u>the Cheshire County 4-H</u> <u>Foundation for 33 years</u>. The Cheshire County Foundation was one of the first in the state. Archie has been president since the foundation was chartered.

He <u>began as a 4-H member</u> with a poultry project in the 1930's by corresponding directly with the University. As a director, he has overseen the expenditure of funds raised by 4-H for awards, trip scholarships, and for other recognition.

He has also been active in <u>countless fund-raising chicken</u> <u>barbeques at the Cheshire Fair</u>. During his presidency, two 4-H buildings and an addition were built at the fair.

He was an active participant in 4-H planning and policysetting during his tenure on the foundation.


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Poultry Digest for December, 1951

For three years now Cheshire County 4-H club members have had instruction in this important process in good marketing as a supplement to the Chicken of Tomorrow Contest. Results: Several members have increased their roaster-raising business and built up a retail business among the summer visitors or neighbors. Richard Warren, extension poultryman, started the program the first year at the field day, assisted by Archie Coll, a Jaffrey, N. H., poultryman.

Another Cheshire County poultry

project that also involves a dressing school each year is the Rotarysponsored capon project. Ten Rotarians give 10 club members 25 male chicks and pay for the caponizing. At the Rotary meeting just before Thanksgiving the sponsors invite the club members to the Keene Rotary meeting at which time a dressed capon ready for the oven is presented to each sponsor. Because of the training the members receive, most remaining capons are retailed by the club members. -Extension Service Review, October, 1951.




