### Thursday, August 11, 2022, 3:30pm. Jaffrey Meetinghouse.


TOME TO the Society's Annual Meeting to be held at the Jaffrey Meetinghouse. The activities of the past Jyear will be briefly reviewed, the President, Treasurer and Trustees will report, and Officers & Directors will be proposed and elected.

At no later than 4PM Ken Sheldon will present Deep Water: The Rest of the Story. Following up the successful launch of his book on the Dean murder, Ken will share more amusing and mystifying anecdotes

and observations encountered in the research and writing about Jaffrey's most enduring mystery. His story begins with his one-man play of the same name (premiered right here in the Meetinghouse on August 13, 2018, the centenary of the 'dastardly deed') which led him to tailoring an absorbing book, finally launching it at the Civic Center on July 16th.

Ken made good use of the Society's Archives as he constructed both his play and the book following the twists & turns of this still yet-tobe-solved murder. He will share some photos and stories he didn't have room for in the book, and shed light on the process he followed in stitching this all together. The result: The first comprehensive and unbiased account of what people in our town have been ruminating on for over a century.


Following the meeting refreshments will be served in the Parish House of First Church. Ken will be there answering questions and selling and signing copies of Deep Water. 👻

#### Monadnock 4

Bruce Hill

THE JAFFREY HISTORICAL SOCIETY owns the historic building on Main Street in Jaffrey Center known as Monadnock #4, an old fire station housing vintage fire-fighting equipment original to our town.

Recognizing that the building needs some care and maintenance the Society applied for and has been awarded a \$5,850 grant from the New Hampshire Preservation ALLIANCE and the 1772 FOUNDATION. This grant requires matching funds from the Society. Last year the Board of Directors authorized the expenditure of up to \$10,000 towards this project.

Plans call for excavating the drip line and constructing proper drainage around the building, examining and replacing sills as needed, repairing the clapboard siding, restoring the leaking roof where needed and cleaning the roof of lichen, re-pointing the chimney, securing the doors, painting the building, and upgrading the exhibits inside. The goal is to preserve this important community resource and develop it as a proper museum. We hope to share the history of firefighting in Jaffrey with citizens and visitors in this remodeled facility next year for the Jaffrey 250th Anniversary. 😻

All spring, right up to a day or so before the 4th of July, there was substantial activity at the Meetinghouse, especially the Tower which was painted from top to bottom. Deteriorated wood high up was replaced, new treads & risers were added to the interior stairs, plaster repairs were undertaken, new metal roofing was added above the bell stage, the clock hands & numerals were removed and are now being repaired/re-gilded, to be re-installed later this summer. And the south facade has been painted, the first time in several years. Half






#### Deep Water Launch



"Indians" whooping it up in front of the Library. We won't be doing this in 2023!




Boy Scouts lined up on Main Street. Note a bit of the Park Theatre on the left.

## Looking Back: Jaffrey's Quartoseptcentennial 1948.

Towns like people have birthdays and anniversaries but those of the former are measured in terms of quarter and half centuries. In 1873 Jaffrey observed its Centennial and in 1923 its Sesquicentennial anniversaries, both appropriately celebrated. In August, 1948, the 175th anniversary celebration took place.

With minds focused ahead on a more ambitious celebration in 1973 on the occasion of the two hundredth anniversary of the incorporation of the town, Jaffrey could not let the 175th anniversary, as a milestone in its history, pass unobserved. The idea of a celebration first came to a group of

citizens at a time when it was too late to bring the matter before the voters at the annual town meeting in March. There remained one thing to do: To ascertain the consensus of the townspeople in regard to such a celebration.

A community meeting was held in Firemen's Hall on the evening of May 24th, over which Charles F. Hart, president of the Jaffrey Outing Club, presided. Preliminary plans to hold a celebration were made and Alice E. E. Lehtinen was chosen general chairman for the event. Helen M. Adams was named clerk and, with Ferdinand Gordon and Carl A. Butler, a committee to publicize the event.

The celebration was held during the weekend of August 20 to 22, with events scheduled for each day. It was a perfect weekend weatherwise. The festivities opened Friday afternoon with a tea and reception held by the Village Improvement Society from two to five o'clock in the Old Meeting House at Jaffrey Center. During the afternoon Melville Academy was opened to the public with many persons visiting the old schoolhouse and its museum of relics of bygone days in Jaffrey. Many of the fine old homes opened their doors to the public during the afternoon.

On Friday evening the Amos Fortune Forum had as its rival a gala anniversary ball in Union Hall with Willy Letourneau's orchestra providing the music.

Saturday, August 21st, was the big day. At nine o'clock that morning a colorful parade assembled at the American Legion Hall and the village streets became scenes of lively activity. It was estimated that probably as many as five

thousand persons were on hand to witness the event. Floats were entered by the civic and fraternal organizations, and by businessmen and individuals. The parade was in four divisions: Civic, industrial, historical, and individual. Particular emphasis was placed on the children's part in the anniversary as they would be the ones planning the bicentennial in 1973. The children's part of the parade consisted of decorated doll carriages and bicycles, a mock wedding, and a toy band, arranged by Mrs. Dorothy Nute and Mrs. Bernice Deschenes. Four out-oftown bands participated in the long parade procession: The Murdock High School Band of Winchendon, Massachusetts, the

Florence Band of Gardner, Massachusetts, the Simplex Time Recorder Band, also of Gardner, and the Red Men's Band of Manchester, New Hampshire.

The parade route was along Peterborough Street to Main Street, then east on Turnpike to Baptist Common, to Stratton Road, then down Main Street to River Street to Charlonne Street, then north to Main Street and down the business section by the reviewing stand between the Common and War Memorial, thence returning to Legion Hall by way of Turnpike and Oak Street.

After the parade the scene shifted to the historical program at the judges' reviewing stand. Welcoming remarks were made by Miss Lehtinen, who introduced the participants: Delcie D. Bean who made appropriate remarks; Douglas Sloane, of the Cathedral of the Pines, who awarded the prizes; State Senator Jason C. Sawyer who addressed the crowd on the growth of the town; and V.F.W. Department Commander Raymond Chase of Dover, N. H., who presented the local unit with a plaque for its community service. Invocation was by Rev. Roger W. Floyd. Besides Mr. Sloane, the judges were Joan Marean, Alice Draper, George B. Farnham. Working with chairman Andrew Bussiere on the parade committee were Louis Rondina, George Robinson, Charles F. Hart, George McInnis, Mrs. Nute and Mrs. Deschenes.

Other features that day included two afternoon ball games at Humiston Field, and a softball game in the evening. A water carnival for the children was held at

Contoocook Lake with the playground supervisor Walter Simcock and Fletcher Taft in charge.

A band concert was held in the evening on the common. United States Representative Sherman Adams of Lincoln, N. H., was the evening speaker and centered his address on the town, its leading figures, and memorable events. Two dances, a square dance in the Old Meeting House and a modern dance in Union Hall, wound up the day's program. A music committee consisted of Hubert S. O'Neil, Emerson Williams, and Wilfred Letourneau. V
