

A UTUMN is fast approaching and soon we'll be headed off on our ANNUAL AUTUMN OUTING, our near neighbor, Troy! Our host will be the Troy Historical Society which calls Kimball Hall its home. A few steps away is the beautifully restored Troy Depot. We'll visit both.

The Troy Historical Society was formed in 1993. Among its collections at Kimball Hall are "displays of household furnishings, a barbershop, a toolshed, firefighters' gear, military artifacts, a general store." There is an informative exhibit on Troy Mills, which turned out the town's most famous export, the fitted horse blanket.

Our first stop will be at the Troy Mills (*host:* Kent Royce), followed by the Troy School (*host:* Linda Jakubowicz), Town Hall (*host:* Janet McCullough) and finishing up at Kimball Hall (*host:* Kathy Marrotte & others) and the Depot (*host:* Bob Harkins). We may make a swing through the Village Cemetery as we enter the town.

Dean Murder Centenary

THE HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY of Jaffrey's longest running and most perplexing of mysteries has come and gone. The Society was fortunate to receive substantial support from the Bean Family Foundation in 2012 and again in 2014. Its purpose: to allow the Society to research and document the Dean Murder and to recognize the murder's centenary in an appropriate fashion.

Since then the Society has:—

Created a website www.deanmurder.org • Scanned thousands of documents, photographs and newspaper clippings and made them available online.
• Organized a Dean Murder Research Group to explore unresolved issues. • Made presentations on the murder around the region. • Planned & created an exhibit on the Dean Murder at the Civic Center. (Those who viewed the exhibit were able to vote for the culprit. The results: Mary Dean 4; None of the Above 5; Hoodlums 11; Laurence Colfelt 26; German Spies 26; Charles Rich 48.) • Commissioned and produced a play, Deep Water, on the Dean Murder which had three sold-out performances at the Meetinghouse.

The Society will continue in the months and years ahead to add to the body of information on the murder and to make it available to researchers and the public at large. **

Kimball Hall

KIMBALL HALL, which dates to the early 1900s, is the headquarters of the Troy Historical Society. At one time an Odd Fellows hall, the building now accommodates display space for the Society's collections and work space for cataloging and research.

















The Tray Depot

ORIGINALLY built as the railroad station for Troy on the Cheshire Railroad, restoration of the Depot began in 2002 and is now a railroad museum overseen by volunteers some of whom once worked on the railroad. (Passenger rail service through Troy ceased in 1958) Jaffrey's depot, which still stands on Blake Street, probably would have been similar as its Troy cousin in layout and looks but sadly nearly every evidence of its railroad history has been lost. Not so in Troy which should be proud of its accomplishment in preservation. **

Soldier's Rock

Some soldiers of the Revolution camped beside this rock on one of their expeditions. During the night one man died and was buried beside the rock on the south side of Mountain Road.



Troy Mills It began operations in 1865 and was famous for its horseblankets. For many years it was operated by the Ripley family. It's been standing largely vacant for some years awaiting redevelopment.



Site of Marlborough Meetinghouse


Construction of Marlborough's meetinghouse started five years before the frame of Jaffrey's meetinghouse was raised. It was last used in 1865.
