Found in a "free" box along the side of Route 124 near Marlborough was a handwritten list of all deaths in Jaffrey from 1841-1893. Robert and Virginia Warfield lived in Jaffrey from 1960 until their deaths. They carved and painted over 7000 detailed and exquisite birds which can be found on display all over the world. The final 50 were donated to the Sharon Arts Center in 2008 where they were on exhibit until the Center closed about 5 years ago. Due to the diligence and generous support of Robert's son, Bob Warfield, this final collection was rescued and returned to Jaffrey. This collection will be displayed by the JHS at the Civic Center in August, with a Grand Reception on August 17. More information to come!

Pompey Freeman

A forgotten hero of the Revolution


Pompey Blackman was born around the year 1755, and although colonial records are sparse it is thought that he was enslaved in Lexington, Massachusetts. Nothing is known of the first 20 years of his life, but in 1775 he is listed as a "tanner's apprentice." Perhaps he apprenticed with Amos Fortune, who at the time was operating his own tannery in nearby Woburn and had been a free man for 6 years. If they did not work together, they certainly knew each other, as we shall see.

Some records indicate he may have fought on April 19, 1775 as the British retreated from Concord. Pompey enlisted in Colonel Samuel Gerrish's regiment of Massachusetts militia in the early spring of 1775.


On June 17, 1775 at the Battle of Bunker Hill, Colonel Gerrish refused orders to advance to the battlefield, so Pompey Blackman may not have seen active combat that day. After Gerrish was discharged for cowardice, his regiment came under the command of Colonel Loammi Baldwin of Woburn. Colonel Baldwin's father James was the legal owner of Violet Baldwin – the future Mrs. Amos Fortune.

In March 1776, Pompey helped reinforce the artillery placed on Dorchester Heights, forcing the British to evacuate Boston. That fall, he served at Fort Ticonderoga, New York through the late fall, helping to repel a British attack via Lake Champlain.

In the spring of 1777, he enlisted for three years in the 15th Massachusetts Regiment. Before marching off, getting his affairs in order, he granted his "trusty friend" Amos Fortune power of attorney.



Pompey served at the Battle of Stillwater near Saratoga, New York and assisted in forcing the surrender of British General Burgoyne's army. He then marched south and spent the winter of 1777-1778 at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania and fought the British at Monmouth Courthouse, New Jersey in June 1778. He again re-enlisted in 1780 and served the Continental army in Rhode Island. His final discharge from the army was November 1, 1780.

Pompey Blackman returned to Massachusetts and presumably reunited with Amos Fortune – who the following year moved to Jaffrey. In 1781 Pompey filed an intention to marry the enslaved woman Susanna Bay of Holliston, Mass. This was forbidden by Duty Bay – presumably Susanna's master.

On October 27 1782, he was 'Baptized & Admitted' into the First Congregational Church of Lexington. He was presumably in poor health, as the church records the service was private as he was sick. Perhaps this led to his eventual move to Jaffrey to work with his trusty friend Amos Fortune, which happened sometime before 1785.

Notably, by 1785 Pompey had made a major personal change as well. At this point records refer to him as "Pompey Freeman." It is presumed he made this change to reflect either his Revolutionary service, his freedom from slavery, or perhaps some other circumstances lost to history.

Pompey Freeman assisted Amos Fortune in his business and personal life for the next five years. He was young – only in his 30s – and Amos Fortune by this time was well into his 70s. Records indicate he occasionally made trips to various taverns and stores, and he no doubt helped with the various tanning processes. He probably even lived with Amos Fortune – some records refer to him as "Pomp Fortune" – and made the move with the Fortune's to the new tannery on the road to Sharon in 1789.

Regrettably, and for unknown reasons, Pompey died on May 20, 1790. He is presumed to be buried in the Old Burying Ground behind the meetinghouse – for where else would he have been buried? – but he has no headstone. I personally believe he deserves better, and perhaps someday a grave marker will be put up to recognize this Revolutionary War hero.
